

GREEN COUNTRY

Tahlequah is the unique destination of Cherokee culture, history, art, and adventure. Established as the Cherokee capitol in 1839, the town soon became a community that planned for the future through developing prosperous businesses, a commitment to higher education, and a desire to grow in Indian Territory.



TRADITION

Tahlequah is brimming with Native American culture. The Cherokee Nation and United Keetowah Band of the Cherokee Indians are the two federally recognized tribes with headquarters in Cherokee County. ATTRACTIONS

ON THE WATER

herokee County offers an abundance of freshwater activities during the summer. With over 30 campgrounds available for RV and primitive camping and two great places to jump-in, adventure-seekers can spend the perfect night in the foothills of the great Ozark Mountains.



FLOAT THE ILLINOIS RIVER

Four miles east of Tahlequah, along Highway 10 North, lies the Illinois River. Visitors come from all over to enjoy the scenery, hiking, and floating experiences offered by the river and its surrounding shores and hills.

Outfitters along the river provide visitors the chance to float by way of tube, raft, canoe, or kayak. Most rentals include a shuttle service, paddles, and life jackets.

OR BOAT LAKE TENKILLER

Located just 15 miles from the heart of Tahlequah, Lake Tenkiller spans nearly 13,000 acres. Visitors have the opportunity to sail, scuba dive, water ski, wakeboard, inner-tube, fish, cruise or just relax. It's the perfect location for a weekend of fun.



Along the shores of Lake Tenkiller, visitors will find full-service marinas to fulfill their every need. For those wishing to enjoy all Lake Tenkiller has to offer, there are resorts, cabins and bed and breakfasts around the lake.

HISTORIC HIGHLIGHTS



1839 - Tahlequah is established as the Cherokee Nation Capitol

After the forced removal, known as the Trail of Tears and settling in Tahlequah, the Cherokees formed their own constitution as a Declaration of Independence from the U.S. government. The constitution declared tribal laws and modeled the U.S. three branches of government.



1869 - Cherokee Nation Capitol Built

Standing in the courthouse square, this twostory neoclassical style brick building originally housed the three branches of Cherokee Nation government. After statehood in 1907, it was converted to the Cherokee County Courthouse. Reopened in 2019, it is now the interactive Cherokee National History Museum.

1851 - Cherokee Male and Female Seminaries open

The Female Seminary was located in Park Hill and served as the first institution of higher learning for women west of the Mississppi. The Male Seminary was identical to the Female Seminary but located southwest of Tahlequah. Prestigious educators



recruited from New England taught courses in Greek, Latin, chemistry, astrology, economics, philosophy 1886 - First telephone system built in Indian territory

Making a giant step toward the future, a group of Cherokees founded and built a 35-mile long-distance commercial telephone line - the first of its kind in the state. It connected the Cherokee Nation capitol with the headquarters of the Five

Civilized Tribes in Muskogee. It is said to have paid for itself in 6 months.



1912 - Ozark and Cherokee Central Railway arrived

The train depot was at West Choctaw St. and Lee Ave. and connected Tahlequah to Fayetteville, Arkansas - about an hour's distance. It was a means of transportation for citizens and agricultural goods.



1985 - Wilma Mankiller becomes first female tribal chief

Wilma Mankiller became the first female chief of the Cherokee Nation and made her mark on history by advocating for Native American and women's rights. As of 2022, she is now featured on the third coin of the American Womens QuartersTM Program from the U.S. Mint.

¦ 1974 - Where the Red Fern Grows Film ' Debut


Holiday

NORTHEASTERN STATE UNIVERSITY

begins long before Oklahoma's first governor officially created Northeastern State Normal School. Instead, it originates with a deep understanding of the importance of education shared by the Cherokees who settled this land long ago.

In 1851, the Cherokees ignited the lamp of learning in the wilderness. The light still burns brightly and this has been a gathering place where dreams find direction.

he roots of NSU run deepest through the bricks and mortar of Seminary Hall (see picture below). Built to ensure that the fire that destroyed its predecessor would not prevent students from achieving their dreams of higher education, the building was dedicated on May 7, 1889.

Today Seminary Hall houses a combination of offices, classrooms and a museum on the third floor.





Rising 11 feet from the ground on a marble base that measures six feet in diameter, the Sequoyah statue stands as the focal point to the Centennial Plaza. Sequoyah, also known as George Guess, was the noted 19th century Cherokee diplomat and educator who created the Cherokee syllabary.



NSU is home to two murals painted by the Kiowa Five, pioneers in modern Native American Art. One, on the wall opposite the entrance of Seminary Hall, depicts Plains Indian warriors in a buffalo hunt, while the other above the main staircase features four American Indian war dancers around five drummers.

Located on Northeastern State University's campus, this statue captures all branches of the U.S. Military and the time periods stipulated. All six bronze figures are arranged on a representation of the world, signifying the United States' widespread role and history over the years.

Cherokee Square Monuments

Several monuments of interest have been erected on Cherokee Square surrounding the Capitol Building. Some of the monuments include:

- John Ross, Chief of the Cherokee Nation during the Trail of Tears and thereafter.
- Oklahoma's first legal newspaper, The Cherokee Advocate, was established in 1844 in a building approximately 100' from the location of the marker.
- Statue of Liberty Replica





Kawi Cafe

Cultural Pathways

The north entrance of the newly constructed pathway in downtown Tahlequah connects the Cherokee National Historical museum to other Cherokee museums and sites. The pathway was designed and planned out of necessity to create a safe passageway for visitors.

Cherokee National Research Center

The Cherokee National Research Center is a stateof-the-art facility that is home to a collection of thousands of Cherokee artifacts and archives formerly housed at the Cherokee Heritage Center..

In addition to protecting and preserving Cherokee assets, the center provides access to archival materials, a research library, and genealogical services to assist in family history research.

EXPLORE

here is no heaven on Earth, but there sure are pieces of it in Cherokee County. Let nature refresh your mind among the fresh forests of the Ozark Mountains. Cherokee Landing State Park and Sequoyah State Park both offer direct access to water, camping, hiking and more.



Hiking

Home to one of the best views in Oklahoma, Sparrow Hawk trail lies just 10 minutes from downtown and sports a sweeping view that overlooks the Illinois River. This moderate 3.8-mile trail with several adjoining paths is the ideal place for hiking, bird watching or simply basking in the views. Bald Eagles are often spotted near the river.



Camping

Camp next to the beautiful Illinois River and fall asleep to the gentle sounds of flowing water or camp along one of our beautiful lakes. The river offers plenty of spaces to camp with US Army Corps of Engineers campgrounds, public access areas and float outfitters. Cherokee Landing and Sequoyah State Park

offer visitors activities from hiking to scuba diving.

THE OUTDOORS

Boating

The Tahlequah area is a boater's paradise with direct access to over 350 miles of shoreline at both Tenkiller Ferry Lake and Fort Gibson Lake. Both lakes are within a thirty-minute drive from downtown Tahlequah and sport an array of activities.

Lake Tenkiller is known for its huge catfish and "Goat Island" where there is a population of goats living on an island in the middle of the lake.




Horseback Riding

Only a 20 minute drive from downtown, visitors can prance through Oklahoma's wilderness on Sequoyah State Park's 300 acres of open woods. A family-friendly choice, experience up-close Oklahoma's natural forests and fauna. A 1-hour guided trail ride is provided at \$30 per person with reservations required. WELCOME TO THE ILLINOIS RIVER

Visitors to the Illinois River are treated to the cool water flowing freely through picturesque landscapes as it winds its way for more than 60 miles through the Oklahoma Ozark foothills. Steep, rocky bluffs, lush forests abundant with birds and other wildlife are just some of the natural attractions to be seen along the river.

R ecreational opportunities abound along the portion of the river that flows parallel to Scenic Highway 10 northeast of Tahlequah. A float trip is the most popular way to experience the Illinois River. Many outfitters are open during the warm weather months offering float trips with canoes, kayaks, rafts and tubes. Please take advantage of the many cabins, motels and camping or RV sites available for short term rentals. Some of these lodging spaces are open year-round. Anglers of all skill levels will want to bring their rods and tackle to try their hand at catching a few fish, but be sure to have a valid Oklahoma fishing license. When not on the water, other local experiences might include hiking, biking or a drive through the J.T. Nickel Preserve.

FLOATERS' GUIDE

FEES

Visitors with their own kayak, canoe, raft, inner tube, or other flotation device must purchase a private float permit.

- Day use permits (wristband dated for the day of your trip) are \$1 per device/day and can be purchased ahead of time. They can be purchased at the GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations Office, Peyton's Place Resort, Hanging Rock Camp, from the GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations Police or a campground host.
- Annual use permits are \$10 per device and are good from January—December. They are decals to be placed to the front right-hand side of your vessel.

Annual permits can be purchased at the GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations Office.

RIVER RULES

Please keep GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations rules in mind while visiting. Fines may be assessed for violations such as littering or possessing glass or styrofoam.

- Glass and styrofoam are prohibited on the river and gravel bars.
- Do not drive on gravel bars, streambeds or into the river.
- To minimize environmental damage to streambanks and gravel bars, do not tie flotation devices together.
- To prevent litter, ice chests should be secured by a strap to keep from spilling its contents and limited to 52 quarts or less. Free trash bags are available at commercial flotation device operations, the GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations field staff and GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations Office.
- Jet skis, airboats, hovercrafts, and boats with motors over 10hp are prohibited. Only during the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation (ODWC) authorized gigging season are motors up to 25 hp allowed.
- Children 12 and under are required to wear life jackets.

PUBLIC ACCESS AREAS

GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations maintain access areas which can be used for picnicking, fishing, swimming, floating and camping.

- Camping is \$14 per night. This fee is per camp site with no more than two tents and two vehicles.
- One RV spot is available, electric only (110 volt, 20 amp), at Round Hollow Public Access Area for \$28 per night.
- Fees are collected on site by GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations Staff.

The following access areas are alcohol-free, meaning alcohol cannot be consumed in the area: Round Hollow, Todd, US 62 Bridge Access on Flint Creek, Lake Frances Dam Public Access Site, US 59 Illinois River Bridge Crossing Access Area, and Carnes Ford Area. Please help the GRDA Scenic Rivers Operations keep these areas clean and safe so others can enjoy the access area.

ALCOHOL (DISTILLED SPIRITS) RULES

- (A) Possession of an open container, or consumption, of alcohol (including Spirits, wine, beer and light or 3.2 beer) is prohibited in seven public access areas: Round Hollow, Todd, US 62 Bridge Access on the Illinois River, US 412 Bridge Access on Flint Creek, Lake Frances Dam Public Access Site, US 59 Illinois River Bridge Crossing Access Area, and Carnes Ford Area.
- (B)(1) Possession of any beverage defined as "Spirits" in the Oklahoma Alcoliolic Beverage Control Act is prohibited on the Scenic Rivers and in public access areas at all times.
- (2) Wine, beer and light beer in the original, non-glass packaging may be possessed and consumed by persons 21 years of age or older while floating on Scenic Rivers and in the Stunkard, Peavine, Edmondson, New Combs Bridge, No Head and Echota public access areas.

A HIKER'S PARADISE



WELLING RIDGE TRAILS

The park's trail system consists of four hiking trails and an interpretive trail suited for beginner to intermediate-level hikers. Located in the Paradise Cove area, Eagles Roost Interpretive Trail is a 1.25 mile long loop that takes guests through a wooded area dotted with oak and hickory trees and along the Fort Gibson Lake flood plains.



SPARROW HAWK PRIMITIVE AREA

Sparrow Hawk is a 3.8 mile trail and is beloved by thousands of college students and river rats who visit the Illinois River. It is rated as moderate and has some of the most beautiful views in northeastern Oklahoma. Dogs and horses are welcome on the trail.

equoyah State Park and Sequoyah Lodge, located on the shores of Fort Gibson Lake, are a haven for water lovers and outdoor enthusiasts. With over 19,000 surface acres of water and 225 miles of shoreline, the park attracts boaters as well as those who just enjoy relaxing on the swim beach. Visitors enjoy hiking, picnicking, horseback riding as well as wildlife watching, golfing and camping.

CHEROKEE LANDING STATE PARK

Tisitors will find this park located at the north end of Lake Tenkiller 10 miles south of Tahlequah on SH 82. The park lies in the heart of Cherokee Territory and is rich in history and beauty. Whether you are looking for a fun-filled day at the park or overnight camping, you won't be disappointed in the opportunities.

Day use visitors will find amenities such as an 18-hole disc golf course, a volleyball court, golf cart rentals and the Red Fox hiking trail. The golf cart rentals make sightseeing fun as you travel a big loop around the park. You may see a few of the Osage Orange Trees. Some areas of the park have beautiful views of the lake from three sides. The Red Fox hiking trail is a natural walking trail underneath 80-100 foot Pine trees. Seasoned hikers refer to this as "Up In The Pines." For day use visitors, many find this to be a small peaceful park to visit. A playground is located in the Choctaw area. Swimming in the crystal clear water, that Lake Tenkiller is famous for, is at the lower south end of the park and features shallow water.

Premium tent sites in the Choctaw and Cherokee campgrounds feature water on all three sides, a loading dock, and boat ramp. Pets are welcome when kept on a leash. Primitive tent camping is also available. Imagine your tent site down by the shoreline of Lake Tenkiller, catching the breeze off the lake. You will also have a table, grill, fire ring and lantern hook at your site.

6 RV sites feature water and electricity in the Creek Area. There are no full hook-ups in the park. 15 RV sites in the Seminole Group Camp offer water and electricity that share the main pedestals. Getting used to a new RV? This might be your area as no backing is required and the level area is perfect for that first time! The Chickasaw area offers small RV pads with lots of shade, a shelter and a view of the limestone cliffs.

The park features a dump station in the Choctaw area. Wildcat Point features a fishing dock. Fishing tournaments are often held at Cherokee Landing State Park. Known for black bass, white bass and crappie, Lake Tenkiller attracts many fishing enthusiasts. This park just might be the one place where you will see the most gray cranes ever! An abundance of wildlife, including white-tailed deer, raccoons, squirrels and many species of songbirds can be viewed at Cherokee Landing State Park.

Sailing, scuba diving, water skiing, wakeboarding, inner-tubing, fishing, cruising and lounging. Bring sunscreen, towels, snacks and water, and get to know Lake Tenkiller in all its beauty.

Several marinas provide rental boats for the day and there are 24 boat ramps around the lake. Many marinas also sell fuel, snacks, swimwear, and water toys. Three marinas, Barnacle Bills, Burnt Cabin and Sixshooter Resort, also serve as floating restaurants that allow casual dress straight from the lake.




